



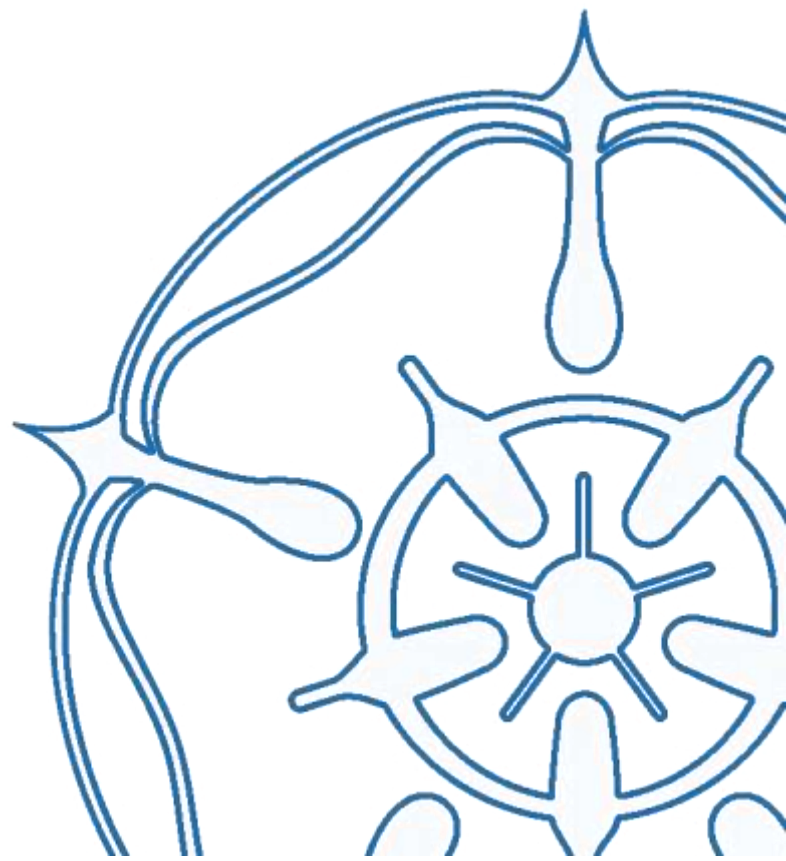

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Effective Revision Techniques

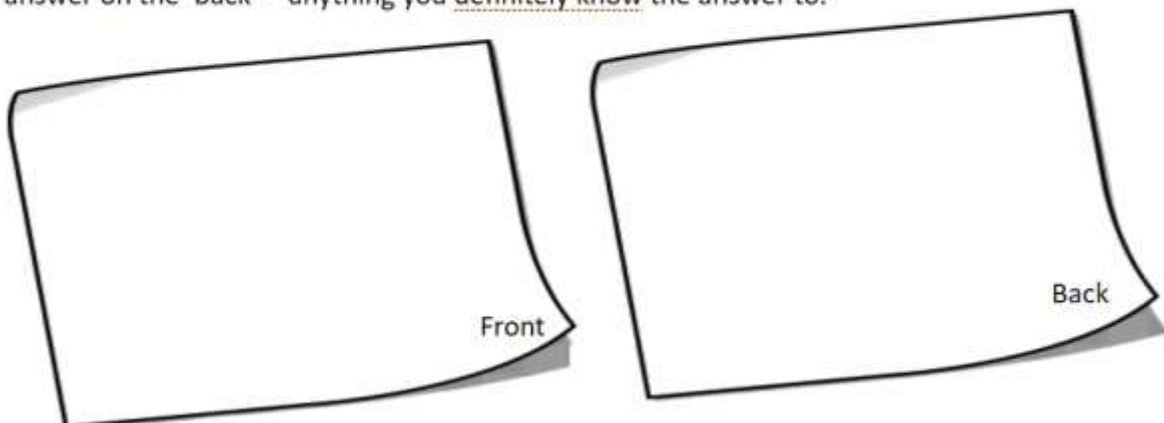
Retrieval practice is a learning strategy where we focus on getting information out. Through the act of retrieval or calling information to mind, our memory for that information is strengthened and forgetting is less likely to occur. Retrieval practice is a powerful tool for improving memory.

Spaced practice – This is when we do little amounts regularly (i.e., one hour a day for six days) as opposed to a lot all at once (i.e., six hours in one day). Spaced practice tends to be more effective for long term memory.

Interleaving – This is the mixing up of topics within a subject. Doing so helps us to make connections between topics and think harder.



On the flash card on the page in your workbook write a question on the 'front' and the answer on the 'back' - anything you definitely know the answer to.





How to Self-quiz

Self-quizzing is a powerful strategy to get knowledge stuck in your long-term memory.

- Look** → Read a small section of your knowledge organiser, e.g. keywords and definitions, labelled diagram
- Cover** → Cover up the definitions or diagram
- Write** → Now, from memory, write them down in your self-quizzing jotter using a blue or black pen
- Correct** → Check your work and make any corrections or additions in a different colour of pen – always use the same colour for corrections (green for example)
- Repeat** → Have another go! Perhaps do this same section in a few days' time (spaced practice)



English

What will the exam look like?

1. A question about your Identity novel (reading) 2. A description task (writing)

What will I be tested on?

- Q1. You will be answering a question about how the writer of your class novel presents the theme of Identity (20 mins)
- Q2. You will be writing a short description (20 mins)

Useful Revision Sources: You will need to revise from your workbooks – Sentences and sentence types; Paragraphing; Descriptive methods from 'War Horse' unit; Vocabulary from Identity Novel and 'War Horse' workbook; Ideas about how the writer presents Identity in your class novel, their methods and how to explain this in What/How/Why paragraphs.

Maths

What will the exam look like?

An assessment paper very similar to your Spring and Autumn paper.

What will I be tested on?

Content from units 1 - 5

What will the exam look like?

40 minutes, 40 marks (multiple choice questions, short response, extended response)

What will I be tested on?

Knowledge and understanding of the concepts in the following units:

- Body Systems
- Reproduction

- Acids and Alkalis

40 minutes, 40 marks (multiple choice questions, short response, extended response)

History

What will the exam look like?

The exam will have four sections:

- Section 1 – Twelve multiple choice questions testing your knowledge of key words.
- Section 2 – Ten short knowledge questions.
- Section 3 – You will be asked to compare two short extracts written by historians.
- Section 4 – You will be asked to write a short essay about a historical event.

What will I be tested on?

- Unit 1: How has London changed over time?
- Unit 2: How did the Normans take control of England after 1066CE?
- Unit 3: Who were the Crusaders?
- Unit 4: What challenges faced medieval monarchs, 1066-1600CE?

Geography

What will the exam look like?

Types of Questions: multiple choice, one word or one sentence answers. Short paragraphs

What will I be tested on?

- Big Ideas: 1-Use geographical knowledge; 2-Show geographical understanding; 4-Use geographical skills
- My World Map Skills, Weather & Climate, Urbanisation and Oceans
- Key words

What will the exam look like?

It is a listening, reading and writing test that covers topics and vocabulary of workbook 1, 2 and 3. Similar to the exams in Terms 1 and 2.

The listening part includes a dictation. Spellings are very important.

In the writing part you must cover all bullet points and grammar is very important. It also includes a translation into French.

The listening part makes 25% of the final mark

The reading part makes 25% of the final mark.

The writing part makes 25% of the final mark.

The speaking part makes 25% of the final mark.

You will also have a short speaking assessment in class where the teacher will ask you some questions from the unit you are studying now: Unit 3.

What will I be tested on?

- AO1: Understanding and responding to different types of spoken language.
- AO2: Communicating effectively by speaking for a variety of purposes.
- AO3: Understanding and responding to different types of written language.
- AO4: Communicating effectively in writing for a variety of purposes.

Spanish

What will the exam look like?

It is a listening, reading and writing test that covers topics and vocabulary of workbook 1, 2 and 3. Similar to the exams in Terms 1 and 2.

The listening part includes a dictation. Spellings are very important.

In the writing part you must cover all bullet points and grammar is very important. It also includes a translation into Spanish.

The listening part makes 25% of the final mark

The reading part makes 25% of the final mark.

The writing part makes 25% of the final mark.

The speaking part makes 25% of the final mark.

You will also have a short speaking assessment in class where the teacher will ask you some questions from the unit you are studying now: Unit 3.

What will I be tested on?

- AO1: Understanding and responding to different types of spoken language.
- AO2: Communicating effectively by speaking for a variety of purposes.
- AO3: Understanding and responding to different types of written language.
- AO4: Communicating effectively in writing for a variety of purposes.

What will the exam look like?

Your exam will be practical.

What will I be tested on?

We will assess your knowledge and understanding of pattern and colour theory.

What will the exam look like?

Types of Questions: multiple choice, one word or one sentence answers. Short paragraphs

What will I be tested on?

Drama

What will the exam look like? The exam will be a short, devised performance in which you will demonstrate vocal skills, physical skills and use of theatrical techniques (use of still image, for example). This exam will give you an opportunity to use the different theatrical styles, genres and techniques that you have learned in year 7.

What will I be tested on? A practical assessment of your use of vocal skills, physical skills and theatrical techniques as way to realise your artistic intentions.

Computer Science

What will the exam look like?

Online exam made up of a mixture of multiple choice and short answer questions

What will I be tested on?

See above, but you can expect to answer questions on keywords and knowledge from units 7.1 - E-Safety, Unit 7.2 - Computational thinking and Units 7.3 Game Development which have been covered during Year 7.

Music

What will the exam look like?

Listening exam- short answer questions on 5 extracts of music. 60 marks in total.

The listening exam will make up 50% of your Summer Grade. The other 50% will come from your practical performance of 'In the Hall of the Mountain King' which happened in lessons before May Half-term.

What will I be tested on?

In the exam you will hear 5 extracts of unfamiliar from our Year 7 topics (Vocal traditions, Stomp and Samba, Music of Asia, Musical Theatre and Development of the orchestra).

You will be tested on musical terminology to describe dynamics, tempo, texture, structure, melody and rhythm, your ability to identify instruments, note values e.g. crotchets and quavers and treble clef notation. There will also be questions about the historical context of the music we've studied.

Design Technology and Food

What will the exam look like?

The assessment will be made up of multiple-choice questions, short response answers and a drawing question.

What will I be tested on?

The assessment will be made up of two parts, Food and Design and Technology. It will cover areas such as food labelling and packaging, the Eatwell guide, the properties of wood, isometric drawing, rendering and colour theory.

Religious Studies

What will the exam look like?

Your exam will be divided into **four sections**:

- **Section 1: 15 key word definitions** (15 marks). These will be a selection of key words taken from the knowledge organisers of:
 - **Unit 1:** Intro to belief
 - **Unit 2:** Code breaking
 - **Unit 3:** What do people believe about God?
 - **Unit 4:** What happens when we die?
- **Section 2:** A **multiple choice** section (10 marks) that will focus on some keywords and key beliefs from each unit / religion covered.
- **Section 3:** A **multiple choice** section (5 marks) where you will need to match some key religious teachings from Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, Judaism and Sikhism to the correct explanations.
- **Section 4:** An **evaluation** question (5 marks) taken from Unit 4, 'What happens when we die?'

There will be a total of 35 marks available.

What will I be tested on?

See above, but you can expect to answer questions on keywords and knowledge from units 1 – 4 which have been covered during Year 7. Unit 5 (forgiveness) will not be in the exam.
